Presentation Title: Are Korean students ready for self-directed L2 learning?

Abstract

In Korea, many students learn English very intensively in private institutes from their elementary school age. They have taken a passive role in highly teacher-directed class for years and have seldom had an opportunity to take responsibility for planning, implementing, and evaluating their own learning. For this reason, Korean English learners depends too much on teachers even in college level, and more and more students lose their motivation for learning English in early age. However, little research has attended to this problem in Korea. Thus, this study attempts to investigate language learning autonomy of Korean students in many different age groups and various L2 learning contexts. To explore their levels of self-access learning, Guglielmino (1977)'s eight factors in self-directed learning readiness scale are revised and employed: openness to learning opportunities, self-concept as an effective learner, initiative and independence in learning, informed acceptance of responsibility for one's own learning, love of learning, creativity, positive orientation to the future, and ability to use basic study skills and problem-solving skills. Also, Korean English learners' motivation types and learning styles are also examined to find out solutions for improving their autonomy and motivation.
