Presentation Title: Listening to the "silent language": Assessing

intercultural communicative competence

Abstract

In this paper we will describe how aspects of intercultural communicative competence can be fostered and assessed in on-line collaborative projects. In order to do so, we will present the findings of an ongoing on-line exchange carried out by the Spanish Language Department of the Leibniz University of Hannover (Germany) and the German Language Department of the Veracruzana University (Xalapa, Mexiko) during the academic year 2008/ 20009. Students collaborated electronically by forums and wiki, using their native language to interact with their partners and exchange personal opinions and sociocultural information.

The aim of the Cultura methodology is to develop understanding of another culture trough a series of steps. This approach and methodology allow students to observe similarities and variations through a process of juxtaposition. Via a common Website (in our case a wiki) and an asynchronous computer-mediated exchange, the students develop a deeper understanding of each other's cultural attitudes, beliefs and values.

Data was collected from questionnaires on the Web, wiki content, language learning diaries, critical incidents and self evaluations. On the basis of Byram's model (1997) of Intercultural Communicative Competence (ICC) and the guidelines for assessment intercultural experience (Byram, 2000), we attempt to assess qualitatively and quantitatively the development of the ICC in e-learning environments.
