## **Abstract**

Ideally classrooms should be social environments in which students use and acquire language in interactive ways. However, encouraging learners to use English in the classroom can be challenging for educators in English as a Foreign Language contexts. In these contexts, learners are often required to complete mandatory English courses, and as such they display little motivation or enthusiasm for communicating in English. This paper examines how a university teacher in Japan has attempted to address this issue through the creation of tasks that foster increased dialogue opportunities between teachers and learners and tasks that place the responsibility for using English in the classroom on the learners themselves. It explores and provides practical examples of how learners were encouraged to use English in the classroom through the completion of self assessment and reflective tasks. It also highlights the role of the instructor in creating an environment that promotes self-responsibility among learners. This paper concludes with an examination of the results of questionnaires and focus group discussions that illustrate students' perceptions of these methods.
