Presentation Title: English in the Discipline: Meeting Diverse

Needs in Large Faculties

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Abstract

The English enhancement courses offered since the last curriculum change at the University of Hong Kong have been a mix of general EAP and ESP programs with EAP courses offered to first year students on entering the university. In 2012, as well as a general EAP course in the first year, the 4-year curriculum will provide what is called "English in the Discipline" courses for second year students: these courses are being developed in collaboration with Faculty.

This presentation focuses on the particular challenges of designing discipline-specific English language curricula in three large faculties: Arts, Engineering, and Social Sciences. Challenges will be identified and faculty-specific responses will be discussed for each of the three faculties in terms of negotiations with faculty, course design, and implementation. Some of the key issues to be considered include: needs and expectations of faculty teachers and students, demands on English Language teachers, and logistical constraints and opportunities. In each faculty these issues have been resolved in different ways resulting in three rather different models of English in the Discipline.
