Subject Synopsis/ Indicative Syllabus	 The content is indicative. The balance of the components, and the corresponding weighting, will be based on the specific needs of the students. Organising final year project report Selecting and organising information; developing appropriate thesis statements and research questions; describing and justifying research methods; planning the chapters and content in various sections. Developing sections of project report Applying language functions for developing various sections of a project report; employing appropriate cohesive devices, vocabulary and text structure; improving editing and proofreading skills; achieving appropriate tone and style in academic writing. Using sources Critically selecting and integrating sources for writing sound academic texts; applying appropriate skills of summarising, paraphrasing and quoting; avoiding plagiarism. Language development Improving and extending relevant features of grammar, vocabulary and pronunciation.			

Teaching/Learning Methodology	The subject is designed to introduce students to the communication skills, specifically written, that they may need to function effectively in their future professions. The study method is primarily seminar-based. Activities include teacher input as well as individual and group work involving drafting and evaluating texts, mini- presentations, discussions and simulations. Students will be referred to information on the Internet and the ELC's Centre for Independent Language Learning. Learning materials developed by the English Language Centre are used throughout this course. Additional reference materials will be recommended as required.
