Objectives	<p>This course aims to enable postgraduate students to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. successfully complete their studies through the medium of English, and2. develop the skills required for postgraduate students to be able to fully participate within the international research community associated with their chosen field of studies and future professions.
Intended Learning Outcomes	<p>By the end of the subject, students should be able to present their project work to academic audiences effectively through:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">a. introducing the background, rationale and objectives of the research orallyb. reviewing the literaturec. explaining the methodology of the researchd. describing and discussing findings orallye. summarising and discussing the significance of the research orallyf. organising and structuring the dissertation orally <p>To achieve the above outcomes, students are expected to use language and text structure appropriate to the context, select information critically, and present and support stance and opinion.</p>
Subject Synopsis/ Indicative Syllabus	<p>This syllabus is indicative. The balance of the components, and the corresponding weighting, will be based on the specific needs of the students.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Research and writing Definition of a research paper; introduction to the language, style and structure of research texts; accessing research resources; compiling and listing an accurate bibliography; taking notes, outlining, and writing drafts.2. Writing research papers, reports and dissertations Stating the objectives; providing background information about the research; outlining the paper, report or dissertation; describing the research methodology; discussing the limitations; writing the literature review; avoiding plagiarism, citing sources, summarising and paraphrasing; reporting and discussing findings; using graphics; writing conclusions and recommendations; writing an abstract; writing acknowledgements; organising the text.3. The mechanics of research writing Consistency in spelling, punctuation, fonts, capitalisation, abbreviations,

	<p>numbering, and lay-out; use of referencing styles; design and use of tables, graphics and illustrations; editing and proofreading.</p> <p>4. The format of research papers and reports Introduction to the international research writing conventions of specific disciplines; practice in preparing the various sections of a research paper and research report.</p> <p>5. Oral presentations of research Purpose of the presentation; terms of reference and audience; presentation of conference papers, progress reports and theses; selection and sequencing of information and materials; use of support materials; rehearsing and timing control; use of voice and body language; variety in pace and style of delivery; techniques for handling questions and discussions.</p> <p>Emphasis will be placed throughout the course on appropriate use of language, including accuracy, coherence and cohesion, and register.</p>
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<p>Teaching/Learning Methodology</p>	<p>The subject is designed to enable postgraduate students to use English in the kinds of contexts that they may be expected to experience within their studies and professional careers. It provides students with opportunities to practise the advanced language skills needed to express original and complex ideas. Throughout this subject, continuing attention will be paid to grammar, vocabulary and pronunciation. The assignments given to students are, as far as possible, based on the interim reports and presentations required at various stages of the postgraduate research project.</p> <p>The study method is primarily based on seminars and tutorials. Activities include teacher input as well as individual and group work involving drafting and evaluating texts, discussions, mini-presentations, and analyses of published texts. Students will be referred to information on the Internet and the ELC's Centre for Independent Language Learning.</p> <p>Learning materials developed by the English Language Centre are used throughout this course. Additional reference materials will be recommended as required.</p>
